The Kennebecasis River is easily accesible for those who wish to sit and watch the waves (or ride them on a windsurfer!) The bench along the waterfront trail offers an unspoiled view of the magnificient sunsets over the Kennebecasis.

The former Village of East Riverside-Kingshurst purchased this wonderful riverfront property prior to amalgamation and the sewer lagoon was subsequently converted to green space. The natural treescape of birch, cedar and pine offers some intriguing photographic opportunities. The trees were planted by a local Scout troop, under the leadership of Rothesay resident Jim McKenna. The roses along the railway were donated to Rothesay by world famous photographer and naturalist Freeman Patterson.

My wife and I enjoy frequent walks in this green space and I highly recommend it as an ideal "walk in the park".

We Can't Help You If We Can't Find You - Have you ever driven down a dark street in a subdivision looking for the home of a friend or relative and not been able to immediately find them? Your emergency services run into this situation far too many times. The majority of people don't realize the time lost because the ambulance or fire truck had to slow down and crawl along a




street trying to pick up a house number. These few seconds or minutes could mean the difference in someone's life during a serious medical emergency. The next time you are driving or walking home after dark, take a minute and check out the homes in your neighbourhood; you'll be amazed at how many numbers are not visible under the cover of darkness. Some have no civic number on display at all! Obviously these people are under the impression nothing will ever happen to them that would require emergency services finding them. In addition to having your civic number properly displayed, it is important to have it lit after dark. Those made from reflective materials stand out at a great distance. Visibility is far more important than looks when it comes to displaying your address. Many homes and businesses have put up their civic number but they are far too small to be easily seen from the street, or do not contrast with the background. Remember; displaying a proper civic number could save the life of a loved one. Please, for the sake of your safety, and all those you cherish, take the time now to ensure you have your civic number properly displayed. Remember to teach fire safety to someone you love! You can order a blue reflective civic number sign from KVFD at a cost of \$20. Call 848-6601 or stop by the station.

The world of online shopping has basically made any object we want available to us at any time of day. The convenience of shopping in your own home is extremely popular and incredibly easy. However, like most financial transactions, there are some major pros and cons when buying online.

• Research who you are buying from and only buy from reputable sellers. If you're planning to purchase from a large online retailer you shouldn't experience any problems. You will, however, want to make sure you understand their policies. Read them carefully.

- Make sure the website is secure. You can tell if the web page is secure by looking at the bottom left-hand or right-hand corner of your browser window. A padlock or key icon indicates that the page is secure.
 - If you are not comfortable submitting your credit card information through the Internet, call the seller and give them the information over the telephone. Under no circumstances should you ever send credit card information through an email.
 - Once you have submitted your credit card and shipping information, you will likely land on a "Thank You" page. This page usually contains a transaction receipt and transaction number. Print this page for your records.
 - Check your credit card statement against your email receipts to make sure everything went through properly.

Rothesay Council Commits to New Recreation Project

Rothesay Council has agreed in principle to build a new arena on Scott Avenue and to convert the existing Rothesay Arena into a multi-purpose recreation facility for basketball, volleyball, tennis, indoor soccer and a variety of other sports and leisure activities. The working budget for the current project is \$13M including the new building and the renovations. The new building will include an indoor walking track and a full-size ice surface. It will be constructed while the existing arena continues to operate to avoid scheduling problems for ice users. Once the new facility is in operation, the ice making equipment in the existing building will be removed, a new multi-purpose floor installed and a series of upgrades implemented to re-purpose the building and refresh its appearance inside and out.

Construction of the new arena is expected to take 8-10 months and renovations to the existing building will follow shortly after. A connecting corridor will allow users to move between the completed buildings. Once the design has been developed and drawings have been prepared, the public will be invited to see the new building concept and learn more about the project.
