The 2016 Capital Works program for the Town is focused on improvements to the sanitary sewer system, extension of sidewalks and road resurfacing. The largest project is the construction of five new wastewater pumping stations and associated pipeworks to redirect wastewater from the lagoons in K-Park to Sagamore Point, the eventual location of a bio-mechanical wastewater treatment plant. This project, at an estimated cost of \$7.5 million, is supplemented by \$5M in capital funding from the federal and provincial governments. Discussions with the two levels of government regarding funding for the treatment plant are ongoing.

A complete rebuild of the water, wastewater and stormwater systems on Almon and Peters Lanes is underway at an estimated cost of \$1.2M. This will renew and improve some of the oldest infrastructure in the municipality. Curb and sidewalk will be extended from Chapel Hill Boulevard to Hampton Road including Parkdale Ave at an estimated cost of a \$0.25M. The following streets are scheduled for resurfacing: Acre, Barbara, Galway, Highbrook, Lori, Progress and Wendy Courts, Ballpark Avenue, Birchview Terrace, Esther, Grist, James, Luke, Naomi and Kent Streets and Wells Lane. Rothesay Road from Rothesay Corner to East Riverside-Kingshurst Park is also included in the total contract price of \$2.4M, partially offset by a Provincial designated roads grant of \$0.73M.

New pedestrian crosswalks will be installed at the bus stop near Riverside Golf course and on Gondola Point Road at River Road.

The Wells Trail is to be paved this spring and the dog park completed this year. Construction on the ball field will be completed this construction season and the field will be playable in 2017. Reconstruction of the parking lot at McGuire Centre is included in the streets resurfacing project.

#### Solid Waste Pick-Up - May 23rd, 2016

- Items must be tied in manageable bundles, weighing no more than 40lbs
- Junked car parts or batteries, appliances, paints/solvents, hazardous waste, containers from hazardous products and other similar items will NOT be accepted

#### Organic Pick-Up - May 30th, 2016

- Leaves, grass clipping & bundled twigs no longer than 4ft and weighing no more than 40lbs
- Residents are required to use compostable bags, non-waxed cartons, or garbage cans that can be easily emptied into the trucks
  - Please DO NOT use your compost cart for this pick-up

All items must be placed curbside by 7am on Monday regardless of your scheduled pick-up day.

# **Congratulations to Rothesay Residents - Curbside Recycling Update**

Congratulations to Rothesay residents!

The success of your participation in curbside recycling is evidenced by the total tonnage collected since the program began in September, 2015 – 244 tonne of fibre, plastics and tins has been diverted from the landfill! Did you know? You can purchase lids and dollies at the Town Hall (848-6600).

The success of the program means less solid waste is being collected so the contractor is able to complete garbage collection routes much quicker than in the past. To ensure the continued efficiency of collection, all items must be curbside by 7:00 am on your scheduled collection day. Residents will see a different type of truck collecting recyclables in the next few weeks. These are operated by a single worker and easily distinguishable from the truck used for compost pickup.

#### Japanese Knotweed In Rothesay

Impact & Identification of Japanese Knotweed

• Spreads quickly, creating dense thickets that degrade wildlife habitats

· Aggressive plant with a strong root system that has been known to break through asphalt and concrete

- Plant populations are extremely persistent. Can survive severe floods and recolonize areas
  Semi-woody perennial plant (1-3m tall) Stems are round, reddish-purple, smooth, bamboo-like appearance
  Leaves are ovate with a flat base, reaching 3-6 inches long and 2-5 inches wide with pointed tips
- · Flowers are greenish-white. Fruit is small and white with wings that help to disperse seeds to new sites
- What Rothesay is Doing · Consulting with an Integrated Pest Management Specialist, Weed Management at New Brunswick AAF

- Removing the plant through mechanical means on a seasonal basis
  Planning an assessment of the extent of the infestation. Actions will be coordinated with property owners · Continually exploring methods of removal including physical removal, developing physical barriers, biological
- control, and steaming/burning \*The Town has a self-imposed ban on the use of chemical pesticides on Town properties so any use of herbicides to control this species must be approved

What You Can Do

· Learn how to properly identify Japanese Knotweed and to effectively manage invasive plants on your property

Avoid using invasive plants in gardens and landscaping
Purchase non-invasive plants from reputable suppliers. Consider the use of native plants which provide habitat and food sources for wildlife

• Do not dispose of invasive plants in the compost pile – discard them in the regular garbage or check with the Town Hall

for disposal information

# You can help keep your waste collectors safe!

Did you that know waste collectors are three times more likely than the average New Brunswick worker to get hurt on the job? You have an important role to play in keeping them safe by properly preparing your garbage and making sure the end of your driveway is free from hazards. Some other tips include:

- Keeping your garbage bags light.
- Putting broken glass in a box labelled "broken glass."
- Driving carefully near waste collectors as they work.
