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ON THE QUESTION:

Mayor Grant opened the matter for discussion. Counc. Shea suggested some thought be given to holding a public forum for those who view this area as a recreation facility. Deputy Mayor Alexander made the following comments: the lands are privately owned and have never been owned by the Town; the current owner has stated publicly they do not appreciate people trespassing on their lands, removing no trespassing signs and littering; there is no current development proposed for this area; there are many competing projects for taxpayer dollars (e.g. new arena, connector tunnel to connect trails on both sides of the Mackay Highway and a new wastewater treatment plant); there are more than just purchase costs involved – including insurance, maintenance and upkeep and lost opportunity costs; the secondary plan was revisited a number of years ago to ensure there is coordinated development in the Hillside Planning area and to balance the community's desire to protect open space with concerns about potential tax rate increases; and the Secondary Plan and Municipal Plan are long horizon strategies that took about four years to develop at great cost.

Deputy Mayor Alexander also commented on green space within Rothesay and suggested the following: total greenspace owned by the Town is about 1150 acres or just over 13% of the total area of the Town, which includes 700 acres in Wells Recreation Park (8.5%); comparable numbers are 0.7% for Centennial Park in Moncton, 1.2% for O'Dell Park in Fredericton and 3% for Rockwood Park in Saint John. Wells Recreation Park is used by residents throughout the region and has a number of groomed trails, wilderness trails, two baseball fields, two tennis courts, one soccer field, a dog park and soon to be opened multi-use building.

Deputy Mayor Alexander noted that demand for housing has increased because of COVID and New Brunswick has seen record-setting population growth; developers recognize the need for development and there are various stages for public input through the development process; there has been a shift in the types of housing desired that includes multi-unit residential buildings, smaller homes and cluster housing. He concluded by acknowledging the passion of those who provided comments and suggested there may be a grassroots opportunity to come together to preserve the lands as it is not feasible at this time for the Town to purchase and preserve the lands.

Mayor Grant thanked Deputy Mayor Alexander for his research and reiterated the Town does not own the land, would not develop it and that the Secondary Plan represents a forty-year build out of coordinated development in the area.

Counc. Shea reiterated that it cannot be denied there is significant public interest and a public meeting on the matter would not mean the Town would buy it, noting that he believes it would be worthwhile.

MOVED by Counc. Shea a public meeting be held with residents to discuss the future of Spyglass Hill.

Motion lost due to lack of seconder.

ON THE QUESTION:

Mayor Grant noted the public hearing was held on January 16, 2023. The following comment were made: Counc. McGuire noted a number of passionate people attended the hearing and expressed their concerns, and he noted the three large buildings being added to Hampton Road were not taken into account in the traffic study; Deputy Mayor Alexander agreed that traffic was an issue and the study did not take into account new developments, and the building density is too high; Counc. Brown agreed that traffic is an issue; Counc. Lewis also agreed traffic is an issue and was disappointed another entrance was to be added to Hampton Road, rather than tying into the Arthur Miller Fields parking lot; Counc. Boyle noted she did not agree with the traffic study and traffic is already an issue on Hampton Road.

Mayor Grant asked the Deputy Mayor to assume the Chair so she could speak to the matter. She noted that national rental units are at the lowest rate in recent history and this project also contains some affordable units; the property is designated for high density and, while she understands the concerns raised at the hearing, she is in favour of the project to help address needs for rental housing.

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Mayor Grant assumed the Chair. Deputy Mayor Alexander agreed that additional housing is needed but was disappointed only 3 of the units were identified as affordable units, and further suggested \$1100/month is not affordable, and the remaining units at \$2300-2400/month is quite steep. NAY votes unanimous. DEFEATED.

ON THE QUESTION:

Town Manager Jarvie advised DO McLean has been working closely with RDC to reach a viable solution on funding for the project, which has seen cost estimates increase from about \$21.6 million to \$32 million. He noted the goal is to keep as many options on the table as possible and this is a fallback decision if there is no additional money or options to restructure the proposal available from the province. Town Manager Jarvie commented that the time is approaching where a decision has to be made as the Town has to improve wastewater quality but does not have the money. He explained the KPark and Renforth lagoons would be de-commissioned and the Sagamore Point lagoon would be upgraded. In aggregate, the cost will be more expensive but staff do not recommend increasing user charges a number of times.

Counc. Shea asked about a timeline. Town Manager Jarvie suggested possibly 2030 for completion, subject to grant money being received. The phased approach is being recommended to possibly allow for some costs to be reimbursed from the original \$21.6 million already approved, if additional funding is not secured. Deputy Mayor Alexander thanked staff for the revised plan and noted it goes a long way to preserve blue spaces in the Town.
